

OFFICIAL CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS
REGULAR SESSION
APRIL 17, 2017

A regular session of the Granite Falls City Council was called to order by Mayor David Smiglewski at 7:00 p.m., Monday, April 17th, in the Council Chambers of City Hall. Council Members present: Sarina Otaibi, Steve Nordaune, Steve Schaub, Joe Fagnano and Scott Peterson. Council Member absent: DuWayne Galow. Staff present: City Manager Crystal Johnson, Finance Director Michael Betker and City Clerk Joan Taylor. Also in attendance were KCC Director Nick Richter, RBS Manager Lynette Bakker, Greg & Lynn Holmstrom, Nicole Zempel, Jessica Gorman and Advocate Tribune News Reporter Alex Sina.

MINUTES: M/S NORDAUNE/SCHAUB TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE APRIL 3RD REGULAR MEETING. Motion carried unanimously by those present.

BILLS: M/S NORDAUNE/SCHAUB TO APPROVE BILLS PRESENTED FOR PAYMENT. Motion carried unanimously by those present.

KCC: KCC Director Nick Richter was in attendance to discuss with council the bids received for the purchase and installation of security equipment to make the KCC a 24/7 facility. Following review of the bids and questions regarding city liability, it was the consensus of council to table this matter to allow time to obtain further information regarding the insurance issue.

LIQUOR STORE: Riverside Bottle Shop Manager Lynette Bakker was in attendance to discuss with council the new Sunday off-sale liquor legislation. Following discussion it was the consensus of council to update the city ordinance to allow the off-sale of liquor on Sundays but to table the discussion about the bottle shop being open on Sundays after July 2nd to a later date.

PUBLIC HEARING: A duly advertised public hearing for the purpose of providing information and receiving public comment regarding allowing chickens within the city limits was called to order by Mayor Smiglewski at 7:28 p.m. Following discussion with those residents in attendance the hearing was closed at 7:52 p.m. It was then the consensus of council to table this matter to obtain information from surrounding cities concerning problems and complaints encountered with allowing chickens within their city limits.

PUBLIC HEARING: A duly advertised public hearing for the purpose of providing information and receiving public comment regarding an increase in the base rate in sewer rates was called to order by Mayor Smiglewski at 7:59 p.m. Following discussion the hearing was closed at 7:8:03 p.m.

Following the public hearing Schaub introduced a resolution and moved its adoption increasing the base monthly cost for sewer rates from \$10.75 to \$16 beginning with the utility bills due June 15, 2017.

RESOLUTION NO. 17-54

RESOLUTION INCREASING SEWER RATES EFFECTIVE WITH UTILITY BILLS DUE
JUNE 15, 2017

WHEREAS, the Granite Falls City Council did advertise in the Granite Falls Advocate Tribune April 17th, for a public hearing to be held Monday, April 17, 2017, at 7:15 p.m. to receive input from the public regarding an increase from \$10.75 to \$16.00 in the monthly base charge to become effective with the utility bills due June 15, 2017; and

WHEREAS, City Code, §50.02, requires a published notice of adoption of such resolution thirty days prior to the effective date thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF GRANITE FALLS, MINNESOTA, approving the adjustment in sewer rates base charge from 10.75 to \$16.00 per month to become effective with the utility bills due June 15, 2017.

REPORTS: The following reports were acknowledged at this time: Airport Commission, Building Inspector, EDA Board, Park Board, Police Chief and Street Committee.

SIDEWALK REIMBURSEMENT: Upon the Street Committee's request, Peterson introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption amending the city's Sidewalk Reimbursement Policy increasing the city's reimbursement to 70% of the cost for replacement of unsafe sidewalks.

RESOLUTION NO. 17-55

RESOLUTION ADOPTING SIDEWALK REIMBURSEMENT POLICY

WHEREAS the Street Committee is recommending council consider adopting a Sidewalk Replacement Policy that would pay 70% of the cost for replacement of unsafe sidewalks.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF GRANITE FALLS, MINNESOTA, adopting a Sidewalk Replacement Policy regarding the replacement of unsafe sidewalks, splitting the cost for the sidewalk 70% city /30% property owner; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that for 2017 the maximum amount paid by the city will not exceed \$20,000 with a maximum per property owner of \$3,500.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF INCREASING LOCAL GOVERNMENT AID
IN THE 2017 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

WHEREAS, Local Government Aid (LGA) is a critical need for our city;
and

WHEREAS, LGA provides funding to restrain property taxes on
homeowners and businesses; and

WHEREAS, LGA helps provide important services such as public safety,
infrastructure, and fire protection; and

WHEREAS, an increase in LGA would help the City of Granite Falls to
hold the line of property tax increases by keeping our local levy flat and also
assist in addressing previously delayed equipment purchases; and

WHEREAS, the state of Minnesota's projected budget surplus stands at
\$1.65 billion; and

WHEREAS, LGA is funded well below the level that was funded in 2002;
and

WHEREAS, in a time of surplus, the state should be able to provide an increase in aid to cities who are facing increased costs due to infrastructure needs, state mandates and inflation in the costs of labor, goods, and services;
and

WHEREAS, no Omnibus Tax Bill was passed by the legislature in 2015 or 2016, thus freezing the LGA appropriation.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Granite Falls supports a permanent increase in the base appropriation for Local Government Aid of \$45.5 million as proposed in HF 672/SF 476, and urges adoption of this proposal by the House and Senate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the following: the legislators representing the City of Granite Falls, Speaker of the House Rep. Kurt Daudt, Senate Majority Leader Sen. Paul Gazelka, House Tax Chair Rep. Greg Davids, Senate Tax Chair Sen. Roger Chamberlain, and Governor Mark Dayton.

SPRING CLEAN UP: Council was advised that the following plans were made for spring clean-up day. The refuse haulers have decided to designate Friday, May 5th from 8:00 a.m. until completion to pick up the following materials:

- Debris, demo and household furnishings will be picked up at \$10 per cubic yard which is the cost for disposal.
- Appliances including computers, monitors, tv's, electronic waste will be picked at the curb at a cost of \$20 per item; with computer and monitor considered 1 item.
- Bagged leaves and grass clippings will be picked up free of charge.

Also the refuse haulers have indicated that should an individual be interested in disposing of a junked vehicle, these would be removed during the month of May free of charge conditioned on the fact that a clear title can be provided.

During the month of May on Tuesday mornings the Public Works Department will pick up brush and branches placed along the boulevards and alleyways.

Police Chief Struffert has indicated that during the officer’s scheduled patrol, the community will be canvassed for compliance with the city’s junked cars and household furnishing ordinances.

Also Lyon County intends to establish a drop off location in Granite Falls at the YMC Highway Shop to collect florescent bulbs and tires on the same date as spring cleanup occurs.
